# NEWS: USDA FARM IMPLEMENTATION AND COLORADO HEMP (CHAMP) UPDATE

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced an <u>update</u> on the implementation status of the 2018 Farm Bill, covering the commodity, conservation, trade, nutrition, credit, rural development, research, forestry, energy, horticulture, crop insurance and other program titles.

There is also clarification on the hemp provisions in the Farm Bill, extending the 2014 Farm Bill provisions for hemp production by 12 months to allow USDA to complete the required rulemaking process, and CSU is working with several state partners to develop a Blueprint for Colorado under the Colorado Hemp Advancement and Management Plan (CHAMP) initiative. #### **NEWS: AGRITOURISM BEST PRACTICES GUIDES**

According to the 2017 Ag Census, 28,575 farms offered agritourism and recreational services such as farm or winery tours, hayrides, hunting, and fishing, totaling \$949.3 million in tourism activity for the US (an increase of 35% from \$704 million in 2012).

The Agritourism website developed with support from a USDA National Institute for Food and Agriculture grant offers a variety of best practice guides that allow users to obtain downloadable and printable information on different aspects of agritourism management including hospitality, collaboration, location, visitors, risk management, and marketing basics.

# CALL FOR COLORADO FOOD SYSTEMS ADVISORY COUNCIL MEMBERS

Governor Jared Polis is seeking new applications for membership on the Colorado Food Systems Advisory Council. The Council works to advance recommendations that strengthen healthy food access for all Coloradans through Colorado agriculture and local food systems and economies.

The Council's duties are to:

- Grow local, regional, and statewide food economies within which producers have access to new markets and low-income populations have access to fresh, affordable, and healthy food.
- Support implementation of the recommendations in the Colorado Blueprint of Food and Agriculture Project, ensure that the Blueprint, or its successor project, is updated as needed, and ensure alignment with other state or local food plans if relevant.
- Conduct research regarding national best practices on food and nutrition assistance, direct
  and intermediated market development, institutional procurement, and farm-to-school
  programs as well as other priorities determined by the council.
- Collaborate with, serve as a resource to, and receive input from local and regional food policy councils in the state.
- Explore methods of collecting and assessing statewide data relating to council activities and report relevant information and data regarding council activities as required by current law.

The 16 members of the Council are required to meet <u>specific individual requirements</u>, <u>outlined in section 1 of House Bill 19-1202</u>.

Learn how to safely produce food from home for a cottage food business. Courses cover a variety of topics that include but are not limited to:

- Basic food safety (proper hygiene, preventing cross-contamination, and temperature control for safe food preparation);
- Foods that are permissible under the updated Colorado Cottage Food Act;
- Ingredient labeling requirements;
- Special considerations for food preparation at higher altitudes; and
- Safe food sampling best practices.
