We believe that mental health care should be another central aspect of the work of Community Voices. Recognizing that mental health is fundamental to the overall well-being of individuals, and the community as a whole, our leaders aim to promote selfcare practices, access to mental health services, and the elimination of stigma associated with mental health problems and overcome oppressive systems.

Mental Health

To do this properly, immigrants and their families need access to culturally and linguistically appropriate mental health care providers, practitioners, and community advocates.

To this end, we aim to:

- Implement culturally relevant interventions
- Advocate for culturally and linguistically responsive care
- Identify social connectors, trusted networks, community-based materials
- Support trauma-informed awareness that is grounded in Latine culture
- Propagate conflict resolution practices that guide collective efforts grounded in community-based solutions.



Mental Health Trainings:

(1) Education-based programs address knowledge gaps about mental health stigma and dispel rumors and stereotypes. Bienvenido encourages participants to openly discuss mental health in a welcoming and accepting environment. By implementing these trainings in our area, we are confident that we can reduce selfreported mental health stigma in our region significantly within the target population.

Information sharing and support group

(2) **Cafecitos con Comadres:** This is a contact-based program that facilitates positive interaction and connection between people with and without mental health conditions to overcome negative attitudes or beliefs due to lack of contact. This program already exists, and if funded, we aim to expand its impact in our county.

Community Events or Outreach

(3) Mental Health Liaison: If funded, this position will help to coordinate the aforementioned efforts while pooling available resources, and implementing programming. This individual will increase the capacity in our workgroup to address mental health and related stigma, promote updated anti-stigma messages within communities, and provide structured feedback on communications strategies to reduce mental health stigma. For example, the individual will host community roundtables, refer clients to services, and post and reshare Let's Talk Colorado messages on our social media channels.

Cuidado Infantil

We've worked to identify and address the obstacles to early care and education for the Latinx community. The Latinx Early Care and EducationTask Force's mission is to ensure that children aged 0-4 have access to safe and high-quality care. This year, we:

- Completed an in-depth assessment of the childcare needs of the Latinx community in La Plata County
- Developed a comprehensive strategic plan for early care and education in the Latinx community



Food Business

We've been working to build and maintain a food business ecosystem that is welcoming, navigable, and accessible for minority-owned businesses. After collecting data on the community's needs directly from business owners, this year we:





Published a database of available commissary kitchens




Created a 140-member community for sharing resources among the food business ecosystem



Held workshops in Spanish and English on food safety, language justice for service-providers, and finding local funding



Launched a pilot program to connect socially disadvantaged food entrepreneurs with Manna's commercial kitchen



EMPOWERMENT

We're currently training Latinx immigrants in La Plata County to take on leadership roles in the community, through the Community Empowerment Program. The program focuses on establishing a sense of community identity and mutual responsibility for the environment, food equity, and civic engagement. It's an introductory training program for people who are unfamiliar with political activism, but who wish to be a force for change within their communities. This year:

- We're training 14 Promotores (Latinx community leaders) in the Community Empowerment Program
- Our Huertas en Casa training promoted urban agriculture
 and provided home gardens to 15 families
- We facilitated a mental health promotion program that focuses on strengthening the emotional and behavioral health of Latinx immigrants
- We collaborated with other organizations to facilitate the first Durango symposium held entirely in Spanish, specifically for immigrants


Language Justice

We support everyone's ability to access resources and participate in community in the language of their hearts. We believe that language justice is a human right.

In 2023 we:

- Built the local interpreter workforce by training 31 prospective interpreters
- Provided 47 local organizations with training and coaching on how to implement language justice, opening the doors to other cultural and social justice opportunities
- Influenced for-profits, nonprofits, and local governments to adopt language justice, including La Plata County, City of Durango, Good Food Collective, and Manna Soup Kitchen
- Launched a Language Justice Toolkit, including a local interpreter list, audio sets for rent, and shared interpretation, translation, and language justice best practices
- Participated in the state-level Language Justice Coalition to influence policy and combine knowledge and resources across the state





Housing Fellow

Good Food Collective and Community Investment Alliance created a <u>Fellowship Position in the La Plata</u> <u>county region</u>.

Currently, one of the projects our Housing Fellow is focused on is supporting the redevelopment of Westside and Triangle Mobile Home Parks. The local Housing Fellow, Berenice Lozano, is a bilingual mortgage

expert and local housing specialist. She has begun working in very close partnership with Elevation Community Land Trust to understand park residents' housing goals and the potential challenges to developing a long-term housing plan for their families.
